

Brittany struggled with classwork, time management and concentration, only to find out later that she had a learning disability. Although she hadn't thought much about what to do after high school, she decided to attend a community college. From there she went on to San Francisco State where she received her BA in Psychology and became the first in her family to graduate. Brittany then started working at the Suicide Prevention Center where she had previously volunteered for some time. She also volunteered at the Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice

where she helped train participants who had recently been released from jail by teaching them basic life skills. These were programs designed to help them adapt to life back with society. She realized then that life would probably be different for these formerly incarcerated individuals had there been programs available to help them through their mental issues or substance abuse problems. She wants to be a part of a solution to break the cycle for a lot of these repeat offenders. She specifically wants to focus her work on inner-city youth to help address this problem. Brittany is currently finishing up her first year at Alliant International University in San Francisco where she is working on her Doctorate in Psychology.
